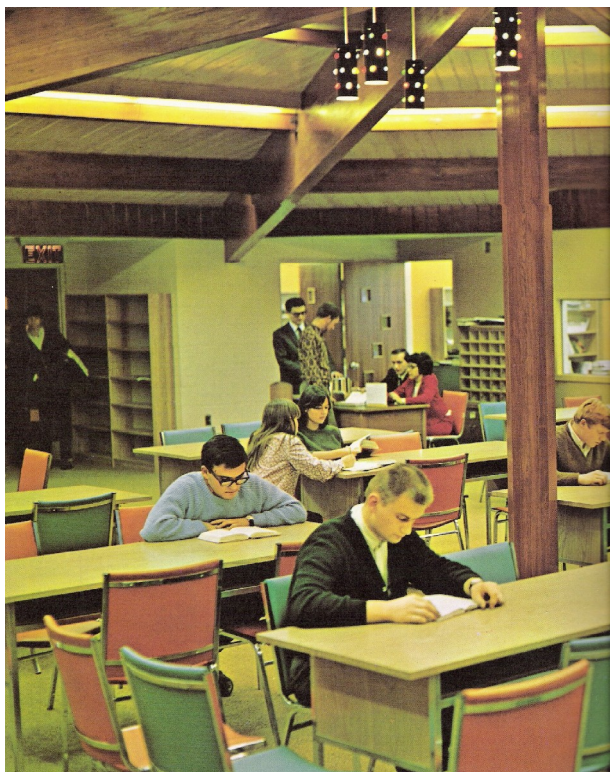


## Changes to Timmins High in 1968, Quill 1968



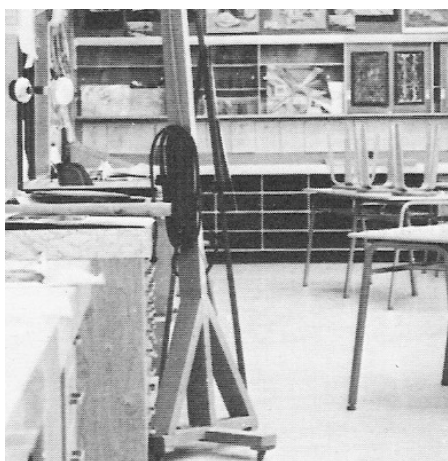
### Opening of Allan G. Baker Library

“The new Allan G. Baker Library which opened formally on April 7, 1968 combines the latest in architectural design with the most modern research facilities.

The library, the largest north of Toronto, has shelving space for over 15,000 volumes and 200 periodicals. Along with 28 study carrels for individual study, the library contains the latest in audio-visual equipment. Students may make use of tape recorders, filmstrip viewers, record players and film loop projectors. A record player, tapes, filmstrips and a film loop library are rapidly being assembled.

Aside from the main reading room, the library contains an audiovisual room and a number of seminar rooms which are directed by the main library.

The library is a welcome addition to Timmins High & Vocational School and fills a long existing gap in our educational system.”



### Bigger and Better Art Room at Timmins High

“This year the Art Department is proud of a new and larger Art Room. The main section of the room, which is used for sketching and painting has several easel-topped desks, a podium for posing or still life, walls lined with corks for display purposes, and a fine collection of Art books. A projecting table can be quickly rolled into the classroom. A smaller section is set up as a craft department for sculpture, print-making and weaving. A small kiln is to be added to make possible the introduction of copper enameling.

Guest speakers have given lessons in lettering, modeling and sculpture. Thanks to Miss Seccombe, Mr. Walton and other teachers, the members of the art Club have been introduced to many new media and have experienced in using their imaginative and creative ability.”
